

## Alaska Steelhead Co. Packing List

The weather in Alaska is highly variable and unpredictable. The old saying "if you don't like the weather, just wait 5 minutes" rings true in Alaska. You can literally experience what seems like 4 seasons in one day and you will be much happier if you are prepared for it.

## **Clothing**

Your clothing is important, you know yourself best and the elements you can handle, so use your best judgment when packing.

- Light to Heavy Wool or Synthetic Long Underwear: Light to heavy weight are good to have (No Cotton). Your lightest thermal tops and bottoms are most commonly worn early in the season. For later in the season, bring heavier layers in addition to the lighter layers to cover all of your bases.
- □ **Light to Midweight Jacket:** (fleece, Primaloft, synthetic down, wool, etc...)

Mid to Heavyweight Jacket: (down, synthetic down, wool,
etc).
Breathable, Waterproof Rain Jacket: This is an absolute must
and can make or break your day, so make sure your current
jacket doesn't leak.
Breathable Waders: There is possibly no other piece of
equipment that can make your trip more comfortable and
enjoyable than good waders that don't leak. It is imperative
that you have waders that don't leak. If you have been or are
having problems with your current waders you will need to
buy a new pair or make very sure that your current ones are not
<u>leaking</u> .
Sturdy Wading Boots: NO FELT SOLES (They have been banned
in AK). Also, if you buy new boots make sure you break them in
because we do some hiking on the small rivers. If you have new
boots make sure to bring moleskin in case of blisters. ALSO, NO
STUDS ON BOOTS THAT CANNOT BE REMOVED. You will be in a
boat part of the time, and cannot wear studs in a boat. If you
are concerned about stability while wading, there are boots
with removable soles. We recommend Korkers with Alumatrax
or something similar for wading stability and Sticky rubber for
the boat.
Casual Boots: A pair of boots to wear around the lodge/cabins
and a pair of slippers is always nice too. We all wear Bogs or
Muck boots but they tend to be overkill for the lodge and
cahins the majority of the time Deck hoots/Xtratuffs seem to

	be the favorite, but by NO means do you need to go out and
	buy anything new.
	Billed Hat: For sun and eye protection.
	Beanie or Stocking Cap: For cold mornings or when you need a
	quick warmup.
	Fingerless Gloves: Bring these if you tend to fish in gloves when
	it's cold to be safe. Again, you know yourself.
	Lightweight Gloves: Not necessary, but nice to have especially
	later in the season.
	Insulated Under Wader Pants: Layering under waders varies, but
	a nice insulated pant can be a great choice. Not necessary if
	you are bringing plenty of layers, up to you!
	Insulated Socks: Bring multiple pairs, you want to stay warm but
	don't want to cut off circulation so try on your waders and
	boots with socks before you leave.
	Polarized Sunglasses: If you have low light sunglasses in addition
	to your everyday pair, bring both.

	Camera Gear: These days a phone is almost all you need, but if
	you have camera gear, be sure remember your battery

charger, computer and/or SD card so you are able to take

□ Pack: Backpack or larger waist/sling pack (preferably
waterproof to keep layers dry).
☐ Water Bottle
□ <b>Basic Fishing Tools:</b> Hemostats, nippers, split shot (BB - 3/0)
** We provide the below, but a lot of our customers want to
bring all of their own fishing equipment.
☐ <b>Fluorocarbon Line:</b> Your preferred tippet can also be used. We
recommend 10lb, 12lb, 15lb and 20lb. We prefer Super FC
Sniper or P-line. Tippet you would use for Trout is not the proper
fluorocarbon material needed for Steelhead because it needs
to be stiffer and more abrasion resistant. (optional)
☐ 9ft 0x, 1x and 2x Salmon Steelhead leaders. 2 of each is plenty.

☐ Large and XL Thingamabobbers in 3 packs. (optional)

<b>Standard Spey Flies:</b> Your favorite patterns for swinging in Pink,
Purple, Black, Orange as well as your favorite Black & Olive
Trout streamers for the smaller rivers (optional)
Size 10, 12 and 14 mil Trout Beads: in Tangerine and Light Roe
(optional)
Owner hooks in size 4 and 6 (optional)
9-10' 7 or 8 weight Single Handed Rods: With reels and floating
line to match. (optional)
11' 7 or 8 weight Switch Rods: With reels and floating line (RIO
Switch line ONLY) to match. (optional)
12'6 - 13'6 7 or 8 Weight Spey Rods: with reels and line (Skagit or
Scandi preferably) to match. (optional)
An assortment of Varied Rate Sinking Tips (5 is typically how
they are sold). We use very light tips so make sure you have an
intermediate tip and heavier from there. (optional)
